PRECISION WRITING Presented by Dr. Chris Holmes WHY ARE THESE LESSONS IMPORTANT? WHY ARE THESE LESSONS IMPORTANT? • They can help students to be better writers. • Communication has never been more important. • Even sizeable problems can be simple to correct. • They can improve performance and grade. • Enough minor errors can sabotage even a good paper. • The glory of God!

SESSION 1—RESEARCHING & ORGANIZING THE PAPER RECEIVING THE ASSIGNMENT RECEIVING THE ASSIGNMENT • When a paper is assigned, learn the instructor's expectations. • If the students select their own topics, it will probably be advantageous to select your topic as quickly as possible. • Do not procrastinate after receiving the assignment!

ASKING PERTINENT QUESTIONS ASKING PERTINENT QUESTIONS • Ask relevant questions early in the research process. • Discover the specific context surrounding your subject. • Investigative questions are essential. • Do an Internet search for basic, initial information. INTERNET OVERVIEW

INTERNET OVERVIEW • The Internet can be very valuable, but it can also mislead. • Discernment is essential when using the Internet. • The Internet contains material that is both helpful and accurate, as well as irrelevant and incorrect. • Some information is accurate but is out of date or biased. ONLINE SEARCHES FOR SOURCES ONLINE SEARCHES FOR SOURCES • Seek sources that are reputable and reviewed. $\bullet\,\mbox{Determine}$ if you need to use primary source materials. Recall that secondary sources by nature are at least one step away from primary sources and may be contaminated with the author's own biases, views, and errors. • Bibliographies can be of immense help.

READING AND TAKING NOTES READING AND TAKING NOTES • This is one of the most important aspects of preparing the paper. It is also one of the most time consuming. • Many type (or cut & paste) sentences into a document. • Document clearly and thoroughly where your material comes from. • Take more notes than you need. THESIS STATEMENT

THESIS STATEMENT • This is the declaration of what you intend to argue in your paper. It is what you contend to be true. • Throughout the course of your paper, you will work to prove that your thesis is correct. • The thesis statement needs to be refined and specific. • The thesis is typically included near the beginning of the paper and toward the end. OUTLINE & FLOW OF THE PAPER

OUTLINE & FLOW OF THE PAPER

- The content of the paper should allow for a natural and logical flow from one area to another.
- Preparing an outline—even if it's not assigned—can be very helpful in both researching and writing the paper.
- Many papers follow a five-point arrangement: Introduction, 1st Point, 2nd Point, 3rd Point, Conclusion.
- Though it can be a time-consuming process, the hard work of organization will pay valuable dividends later.
