

HT50 • Life and Theology of Geerhardus Vos Dr. Lane Tipton & Danny Olinger 2 Credit Hours

Course Description

As part of CBTS's mission to prepare men to undertake the *full* range of pastoral responsibilities and to equip Christian men and women for effective service in the church, this course seeks to advance the student's understanding and practice of the discipline of Reformed Biblical Theology as put forth in the writings of Geerhardus Vos and in accord with the Westminster Confession of Faith and Catechisms.

Educational Objectives

- 1. The student will engage Vos's understanding that the Bible is a historical record, divinely inspired and infallible that culminates in the self-disclosure of Jesus Christ, the eternal Son of God. As such, the circle of revelation is not a school, but a covenant that comes to expression in history in and through God for his sovereignly determined ends. Special emphasis will also be placed on the Reformed belief that eschatology precedes soteriology.
- 2. To learn important lessons about biblical interpretation and application from a trusted and faithful historical figure. Learn from the example of a faithful theologian in the midst doctrinal drift and theological controversy.
- 3. To grow in love and appreciation for our Triune God of the Scriptures in the wisdom He displays through study of the life and theology of a faithful theologian and churchman.

CBTS students are expected to read (not skim) all required reading assignments in order to receive credit for a class.

Course Requirements

- 1. <u>Lecture/Reading Completion</u>: At the end of the course students will take a "quiz" on CBTS Pathway stating that they have completed viewing all the lectures and completed all the assigned reading.
- 2. <u>Book Review</u>: Each student will write a 4-to-5-page critical book review of Olinger according to CBTS Book Review Style guide. Include practical lessons from the life of a faithful theologian in the midst of doctrinal drift and theological controversy.
- 3. <u>Term Paper</u>: Each student will write a 10-to-12-page paper on Vos's view of Reformed Biblical Theology. Student will select one of the facets of Vos's Biblical Theology presented in the course and a description and explanation of its importance and relevance to ministry. The paper must conform to the latest version of the CBTS Style Sheet.

Grading Plan

Grades will be calculated according to the following breakdown: (example below)
